

12 – 19 January SCHOOLS PORTRAIT PROJECT

(open 1–5pm on the 12th, thereafter normal hours)

An important element of last year's exhibition at the Bluecoat Let the canvas come to life with dark faces, was a highly successful artist-in-schools project, made possible with funding from Merseyside Arts, Liverpool City Council and Mrs M Bibby (via Liverpool Council of Social Services). In the exhibition, 57 Black artists presented self portraits in a variety of ways, and this theme of identity and choosing how to make images of oneself, provided the starting point for five local artists to work in local primary schools. The participants were Lynda Lee/ Chatsworth St, Dionne Sparks/ Granby St, Leonora Walker/St Margarets, Jac Wilkie/Tiber St and Karl Eversley/Windsor St. We'd like to thank all those involved in the project, the results of which can be seen in this week-long display in the gallery.

PARABLE ISLAND some aspects of recent Irish art Part One 26 January – 23 February Part Two 2 March – 6 April

As its subtitle indicates, this two part exhibition focuses on aspects of contemporary art practice in Ireland, both the Republic and Northern Ireland by presenting two overlapping exhibitions. One draws together varying strands of art practice in relation to abstraction, whether the starting point be Constructivism, or the urge to abstract from conventional genres such as landscape, still-life and figurative painting in general. The other is focussed predominantly upon the social and the political, exploring various themes, from the Troubles to the territorial imperatives of power and sexuality. Both exhibitions are deliberately cross-connected and pluralistic in intent. Comprising paintings, drawings, installations, mixed media, photoworks and sculpture, including pieces displayed in both the front and garden courtyards, the exhibition presents a broad range of work. For the first in a series of occasional Saturday video presentations focusing on aspects of contemporary visual art, the Bluecoat has teamed up with Moviola, Merseyside's premier film and video promoter, to present a selection of films on the work of perhaps the most controversial and significant postwar German artist, Joseph Beuys. Until his death in 1986, Beuys attracted the most media attention of any European artist of his time, leading to accusations that the figure was more interesting than his work. Certainly he disdained no role or forum to express or make himself understood. He used satellite TV or open discussion, was sculptor and actor, shaman and teacher, he turned art into politics and politics into art. This video programme presents speeches and interviews with Beuys as well as recordings of his performances and some of his experimental film collaborations. John Halpern's 1988 Joseph Beuys -Transformer provides an introduction to the artist's work and theories, and is accompanied by a selection of films including Social Sculpture (1969), Felt TV (1970), I like America and America likes me (1974/8). 
