

bluecoatconnect new opportunities to participate in the arts



The Bluecoat recently received an award from the National Lottery's Arts For Everyone (A4E) scheme towards an innovative two year education outreach programme starting this spring. Entitled **bluecoatconnect**, it will literally connect local artists with groups of people on Merseyside through a series of participatory workshops embracing music, dance, visual art, writing and live art. Culminating in a celebratory exhibition and events showcase of the work produced at the end of 2000, the project provides new and exciting opportunities for local people to learn creative skills, as well as enhancing the Bluecoat's programme throughout the period. We have teamed up with eight partners representing schools, youth clubs, adult day centres, a city farm, community and disabled groups, to develop this wide ranging programme, and we are appointing a specialist project manager to coordinate activities. Though participants have largely been identified, we are keen to hear from any local groups interested in discussing other collaborative opportunities with the Bluecoat.

Away From Home

23 January – 21 February

Four artists resident at sites away from home have explored how values are shaped by the environments that we live and work in. In this exhibition Blaise Drummond, Susan Bleakley, Brigitte Jurack and Richard Hughes present their individual perspectives in an often unorthodox and bizarre collection of media. In Manifestering, Susan Bleakley has remade several pillows with rubber, salt and tight binding to offer a sense of revulsion that goes against the comfort of the old, familiar pillow and the impressions of the sleeper. Blaise Drummond's A Project for a Wood resembles an architect's model for a future woodland planting, exploring the fascinating paradox of constructing the natural, as often what we recognise as 'wild' or 'natural' has, in fact, been designated as such by us. Richard Hughes essentially reworks objects or ideas from popular culture, teasing and twisting our general acceptance of certain ideas and truths. His Lost Sock has been made from the anonymous fluff left behind in a launderette and has been moulded into a comedy standard, the disappearing sock from the laundry. Brigitte Jurack has produced a light and sound sculpture which questions the legitimacy of the widely accepted term 'Global Village', its vagueness invites many different interpretations but also implies conformity and sameness. Jurack reflects this inconsistency and invites the viewer to drift into individual reveries as well as shared memories and associations.





Janet Hodgson History Lesson

6 March - 17 April

Due to substantial awards from the National Lottery through the Arts Council of England, North West Arts Board, Liverpool John Moores University and the Henry Moore Foundation, Bluecoat has commissioned Janet Hodgson's *History Lesson* – a site specific video installation playing with notions of history and interpretation, authenticity and fabrication, fiction and truth. During filming, the current gallery space will revert to its former interior setting as a school house from the last century, with children and others dressed in period costume, acting out scenes from the past. For the exhibition, the gallery is animated with projections occurring simultaneously in four rooms, a three dimensional film that the audience appear to be part of but unable to affect. The site being used as both subject and object of the work, engaging with its history, recording not only the process of making the work but also recording the seemingly transparent act of recording that process. No attempt is made to impose a hierarchy of importance on the various activities taking place in front of the camera, the work focuses equally on the mundane as on the extraordinary.


David Tse An English Country Garden

The 'poor neighbour' with the long grass, who had no time to look after their garden or teach the love of nature to their child. Now Tse is nurturing his own garden, his family and himself, in a sometimes cold environment, trying to create natural beauty in the urban jungle. An English Country Garden is an exploration between theatre culture and horticulture, a live art experiment that invites the audience to participate and celebrate cultural and biodiversity in Britain as the Millennium draws to a close. 

Andy Hamilton Tenor Saxophonist 'The Godfather of Calypso Jazz'

Andy Hamilton has been playing jazz for 60 years. He first started playing on a home-made bamboo pipe in his native Jamaica and by the 1940s his band Andy Hamilton and the Blue Notes became an overnight sensation when they were asked to play on Errol Flynn's party yacht. When Errol asked Andy to play jazz he could dance to, Andy came up with a new style of music that would later be termed 'Calypso Jazz'

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After nearly half a century of playing and teaching jazz in local pubs and clubs in Birmingham, Andy finally released his debut album to great critical acclaim at the age of 72. His second album Jamaica by Night strongly and joyously celebrates his Caribbean roots with an evocative, sensual fusion of reggae, swing-blues and calypso and has established Andy Hamilton's reputation as one jazz player who can't help but improve with age


