

BLUECOAT DEVELOPMENT GETS GO AHEAD

Bluecoat Arts Centre has been granted planning permission to develop Britain's oldest arts centre - and the oldest building in Liverpool city centre - as an exciting arts, heritage, cultural business and retail complex for the 21st Century. Liverpool City Council approved the plans in January, and listed building consent was given in February. Work on the scheme is not expected to start until early 2005, once detailed designs have been completed and the rest of the funding secured.

The £9.75 million scheme will secure the future of one of the city's best-loved buildings, retaining its special qualities whilst addressing its much-needed access and accommodation problems. The development will restore the historic fabric of this Grade One listed building, create a new wing housing an art gallery and performance space for Bluecoat's contemporary arts programme, and rationalise existing spaces to dramatically improve access throughout

There is a public display about the development that includes architect's models and information, in Bluecoat's foyer. Open Monday – Saturday, 9am-5.30pm, it will evolve to keep you up-to-date with the Development's progress over the coming months. 



REBECCA REID - BEFORE JASON'S HOUSE AT CORINTH, L5

Bluecoat Associate Artist, Rebecca Reid, inspired by Euripedes' Medea, presents a lecture with slides that draws parallels with local town

Jason and Medea arrive at Corinth seeking asylum. Jason seeks to secure the family's social position by becoming engaged to the King's daughter. To revenge herself on Jason, Medea orchestrates the death of both the King and Princess before taking the lives of her own two sons by Jason.

In post war Liverpool, urban planners incorporated the character names and setting of this story into their housing improvement scheme. A Corinth Tower was built that now stands half empty. At an angle ran Jason Street, now partially renamed so that Boundary Street separates Jason from Medea Tower. The towerblock was demolished and replaced by a close of houses, the theory being that the close encouraged less criminality than the previous through road.

In wry and engaging style Reid recalls the recent history of Jason and Medea, taking her audience on an imaginative tour of local planning decisions. She puts forward a case for the built environment as a site for the transmission of myth and a theatre for memory and forgetfulness.

This event deals with themes and imagery that may not be suitable for audiences under 16 years old.

SUSAN PHILIPSZ AND PAUL ROONEY I FT US TAKE YOU THERE

3 APRIL - 22 MAY

Susan Philipsz and Paul Rooney both produce works which explore the way that sound can be a trigger for memory, and the emotional charge that the human voice and music can bring to a space. Let Us Take You There brings together a number of new and recent works by the artists.

Liverpool-based Paul Rooney continues to develop his interest in the relationship between music and an 'empty' static video image. His newest work is a film of the view from the Bradford and Bingley Building Society in the centre of Sheffield, where a lone female sings an unaccompanied song based on 'The Sound of the Crowd' by The Human League. The window in the film is the site of the entrance to The Crazy Daisy Disco, the spot where Jo and Susanne of the Human League were 'discovered' by Phil Oakey. The story of the moment of their discovery extends Rooney's interest in the social and personal aspects of popular entertainment.

Susan Philipsz' latest work is a short film loop entitled Returning, which depicts a scene in a Berlin park where passers-by stop to read the inscription on a monument to a revolutionary uprising. The film is accompanied by an evocative soundtrack which creates a sense of returning to a memorable moment, which may be private or public, long ago or recent. It is also about getting lost, language barriers and seeing through the eyes of a foreigner.

Susan Philipsz recently completed a residency at PS1 New York, and exhibited in the Glenn Dimplex Award at IMMA, Dublin. Paul Rooney was MOMART Fellow at Tate Liverpool 2002-3. Last year he was winner of the first Comme Ça Art Prize North.



SUSAN HEFUNA - XCULTURAL CODES

XCULTURAL CODES is the first one-person exhibition in the UK by acclaimed German/Egyptian artist Susan Hefuna. It includes new and recent works in a wide range of media - photography, drawing, video and sculpture.

Hefuna embraces themes of identity, difference and diaspora, reflecting her own dual European/African heritage. She subtly questions whether globalisation and the acceleration of technological 'advances' actually bring us any closer to understanding the lived experience of people in different countries, with different cultures, with increasingly complex histories and backgrounds.

Resisting the notion of a comfortable 'melting pot' or 'global village', she draws on her own experiences to explore how the meaning of the everyday, such as household objects or neighbourhood scenery, can change when forces outside our control come into play. By focusing on elements that may be considered 'exotic' from one perspective, and mundane from another, she melds the inner and outer worlds of the experience of the 'displaced', the 'migrant' and the 'foreigner', illuminating the intensity and complexity of their relationship in the process.

The exhibition is accompanied by an illustrated catalogue published in English and German by Kehrer Verlag. The publication includes an essay on Susan Hefuna's work by Bluecoat Director, Bryan Biggs.

THE LEGACY OF EDWARD SAID PRESENTED BY PROFESSOR BASHIR MAKHOUL TUESDAY 13 JULY 6PM Free

Edward Said, who died in 2003 was one of the leading literary critics of the 20th century and perhaps the most visible and articulate advocate of the Palestinian cause in the US. His books, such as Orientalism and Culture and Imperialism, remain immensely influential across the cultural spectrum. In this talk, presented against the backdrop of Susan Hefuna's exhibition at Bluecoat, Professor Bashir Makhoul discusses Said's continuing influence on visual arts practitioners, citing his own work and that of other artists of the Arab diaspora. The talk will be followed by a discussion.

Professor Bashir Makhoul is Head of Art & Design at The University of Luton. He has exhibited internationally, including Hayward Gallery London, Liverpool Biennial, National Museum Jordan, in Pakistan, Berlin, Sydney and New York.

Saxophonist, writer and activist Gilad Atzmon returns to Bluecoat following last year's spectacular Arabic Festival appearance where he amazed listeners with his dynamic jazz sound that powerfully evokes the Middle East. Gilad's work combines great bebop artistry with political and cultural references to give it a unique, personal flavour shaped by his background as a secular Israeli Jew who witnessed and empathises with the daily sufferings of Palestinians. Moving to London he founded his own band the Orient House Ensemble, and became a member of the Blockheads. Ibadi is a powerful performance that combines rhythm, vocals, acrobatics, poetry, dance, drama and wiggling! According to Osun Arts, Nigerians believe in making use of their waist when dancing, giving them the ability to wiggle. Nigerian dance is not completed without wiggling; the Yorubas therefore will say 'Ibadi ni jo wa', which translates as 'the dance is on the waist'.

Osun Arts stress the importance of music and dance to the African way of life. Beyond a simple means of artistic expression, dances are sacred, holding deeply symbolic meanings and significance. With this new piece, Osun Arts seek to celebrate and preserve these ancient traditions. A sensory delight, the show features elaborate costumes and energetic drumming and movement with traditional dances from Nigeria and other parts of Africa.
