DEVELOPMENT NEWS

Bluecoat's plans for a major refurbishment and extension to its building received a boost recently with confirmation of a £2.75 million award from Arts Council England under its Arts Capital Programme Two, funded from the National Lottery. Decisions on further funding bids will be announced in 2004. We will be spending this year working on detailed designs for this exciting project that will restore Liverpool's oldest city centre building and create new facilities for our arts programme, heritage interpretation, artists' studios, cultural industry businesses, retailers and the many other activities that take place at Bluecoat.

From late January there will be a display in our foyer, including a model of the scheme by our architects, **Biq Architecten** from Rotterdam. There will be public events during the year and opportunities for you to find out more about the scheme which will commence in 2005. Please contact our project development team on 0151 702 5329 for more information.

In the meantime our arts and participation programme continues with a range of exhibitions, performances of dance, music, literature and live art, workshops, classes and much more. 2004 highlights include the Liverpool Arabic Arts Festival in July and the UK's largest visual arts festival, the Liverpool Biennial in the Autumn. We start the year with the programme outlined in this brochure, and the building is open six days a week with its offer of shops, café, craft gallery, garden and rooms for hire.

GRACE SURMAN - LIVERPOOL WHITE THURSDAY 12 & FRIDAY 13 FEBRUARY 8.00PM Tickets £5 [£3 conc]

Since 1994, Grace Surman has worked in performance, installation and video, nationally and internationally, both solo and collaboratively with performers including Wendy Houstoun, The Max Factory and Reckless Sleepers.

She explores ideas about containment and being trapped - in a situation or by a set of actions or stereotypes. Liverpool White is a solo performance shaped in part by the artist's experiences as a magician's assistant and her attempts to work through this role, with its illusory conventions and audience expectations, The result has been described as "daft hilarity and something poignant, even distressing" [Mary Brennan, The Scottish Herald].

The title of the performance refers to the location of the event - Glasgow White becomes Leeds White, and now Liverpool White, and is less about Surman responding directly to these places, but more about the similarities between them.

Based in Glasgow, Surman teaches contemporary theatre practice at the Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama. She collaborates on a regular basis with visual artist Annis Joslin and Manchester-based multimedia group, Municipal Constructions.

ADAM DANT -THE PEOPLE WHO LIVE ON THE PLANK UNTIL SATURDAY FEBRUARY 7 Free

This exhibition of drawings by British artist Adam Dant features a new series of large scale works of awesome complexity, illustrating every kind of human foible. Narratives are presented in roundels, which increase in size through the series. Heir to William Hogarth's popular satirical prints of the 18th Century, these intricate drawings are also reminiscent of oldfashioned comic books or medieval illuminated manuscripts, and are timeless, like the human folly they depict. Dant's explorations of the vagaries of humanity are, however, narratives lacking any kind of resolution, moral or otherwise.

Adam Dant is the creator of Donald Parsnips' Daily Journal, a comic-strip pamphlet that also appeared as a column in the Independent on Sunday. He created 'The Anecdotal Plan of Tate Britain' for Tate Magazine in 2001 and won the Jerwood Drawing Prize in 2002.


