WELCOME

The local and the global come together in this Autumn's Bluecoat programme which offers a range of contemporary artists working in music, literature, visual and live art. The Gallery has an international flavour with three exhibitions featuring drawing, video and installation, including Senseless, which was initiated in Austria and is Bluecoat's contribution to this year's Disability and Deaf Arts Festival, DaDaFest. Our performance programme includes participation in Black History Month and the Poetry Jukebox Tour, with music and literature events, and the Frakture Festival highlights some of the best and strangest improvised music around. From our popular participation arts programme, Connect, we launch a poetry anthology and CD. Whether you're interested in trying your hand at printmaking or drawing, experiencing live art or finding out why Lonnie Donegan's Rock Island Line is arguably the most significant British record (see page 9), then read on.

BETWEEN US MARIELE NEUDECKER **30 AUGUST - 18 OCTOBER**

The German born artist, Mariele Neudecker who now lives in Bristol, uses landscape as an elemental source of inspiration, as symbol and metaphor in her timeless, imaginative works. The exhibition features video, photographic works and a number of the artist's signature 'tank'

Think of One Thing features four tanks housing mountainous peaks cloaked in the dense concoctions created by the artist to simulate mist and rain. These miniature landscapes in glass vitrines, filled with water and treated with salt solutions and dyes, indicate a key theme in her work, the relationship between observation and imagination.

The Land of the Bead is a film shot from a hot air balloon that explores an apparently post-apocalyptic desert landscape. Filmed in Luxor, Egypt, the artist pointed her care artist pointed her camera directly at the ground and let the balloon's meanderings data meanderings determine what she filmed. At first glance it seems like an uninhabited planet to be a seemine what she filmed. uninhabited planet, however this landscape teems with evidence of humanity a symptotic difference of the second symptotic humanity - everyday life, small scale farming, a moving car, and the sounds of a distant. sounds of a distant barking dog and the regular, rhythmic blasts of the hot-air driving the balloon.



SENSELESS - ART / BODIES / MISFITS MARTIN BRUCH, E.A.R, ROLF GIEGOLD, WOLFGANG GEORGSDORF JU GOSLING AKA JU90, ALISON JONES, SIRKKA-LIISA SASS SEBASTIAN SOLARI, WOLFGANG TEMMEL, WOCHENKLAUSUR 30 OCTOBER - 6 DECEMBER

Sensless is an international exhibition by disabled artists from Austria. Germany, Finland and the UK, and was originally conceived by artist and curator Wolfgang Temmel as Sinnlos for the Kunstlerhaus in Graz, Austria, this year's European Capital of Culture.

It includes video, photography, installation and interventions in the public realm, by artists who use their experiences of disability to explore a wide range of subjects and ideas. They confront viewers with metaphorical spaces and perceptually disconcerting situations to provoke the recognition of otherness within themselves.

This is not an exhibition about disabled people, but a project which explores disability and issues around disabling forces in daily life, society and art. Sensless also presents itself as a platform for "new ideas and actions" and strategies for change.

ADAM DANT - THE PEOPLE WHO LIVE ON THE PLANK **13 DECEMBER - 7 FEBRUARY** The Gallery will close for Christmas on 23 December and reopen on 2 January

This exhibition of drawings by British artist Adam Dant features a new series of large scale works of awesome complexity, illustrating every kind of human foible.

In The People Who Live On The Plank, narratives are presented in roundels which increase in size through the series. These intricate drawings, whilst reminiscent of old-fashioned comic books or medieval illuminated manuscripts, are timeless, like the human folly they depict. Each roundel details scenes of public, living or working spaces, usually filled with people engaged in activities that range from the humdrum to the catastrophic. These drawings are heir to William Hogarth's popular satirical prints of the 18th Century. Dant's explorations of the vagaries of humanity are, however, narratives lacking any kind of resolution, moral or otherwise.

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IMPORT/EXPORT reflects Dant's fascination with the development of the booming, populous city of Lagos, which might be construed as a model for how other cities may evolve. He uses a Nigerian Import/Export company in London as a conduit to import material for this drawing.

Adam Dant is the creator of Donald Parsnips' Daily Journal, a comic-strip pamphlet handed out to passers by in London or wherever he travelled between 1995-99. Donald Parsnips appeared as a column in the Independent on Sunday. He created The Anecdotal Plan of Tate Britain for Tate Magazine in 2001 and won the Jerwood Drawing Prize in 2002. He has exhibited worldwide and his work is in numerous public and private collections.

Here's the way we play it focuses on the importance of Skiffle's contribution to British popular music, debunking the myth that it was simply a 1950's teenage craze.

Musicians and academics will reflect the notion of Skiffle as home made. DIY music with no set boundaries. Papers on Lonnie Donegan, coffee bar culture and Skiffle's roots in 20s/30s American folk, blues and novelty music, will suggest it is a forerunner of Punk and Garage - music generally made without either expensive equipment or great technical dexterity. Live sets from the Ratcatchers Skiffle Group, Ugly Dog Skiffle Combo and others will attest to Skiffle's continuity as a living, evolving musical form that transcends mere revivalism

Alan Clayson, pop historian, leader of the legendary Clayson and the Argonauts, and musical associate of Screaming Lord Sutch, presents an evening of chanson, French song delivered in his own inimitable Anglicised style. A rehearsed reading of an extract from work in progress by Tayo Aluko and Colin Watts. It's New York, 1956 and Paul Robeson, the great African American actor, singer and political activist has been summoned to appear before the House on un-American Activities Committee. They want him to name names of 'comrades' and denounce Stalin. They threaten to expose his long-standing love affair with the white wife of a prominent friend if he doesn't cooperate. His lover happens to be a descendant of 18th Century Liverpool slave traders, one of whom was in fact West African. Her ancestors 'visit' him, tell their story and help him decide.

AISHA 8.00PM

Aisha is an American soul and jazz singer-songwriter and pianist, whose family's musical pedigree reaches back to Duke Ellington. A live performer of unbridled power, she has thrilled crowds from Chicago to Toronto, London, Glasgow, Stockholm and Dublin. Aisha's solo concert provides a vivid demonstration of why Black American music has underpinned all our histories. Her artistry is insistent, enchanting and above all soulful.

AUTUMN LIVE ART: WATCH THIS SPACE

Taking art out of conventional settings via a series of events in and beyond the building, Bluecoat continues its programme of live art this autumn with work that blurs the distinctions between visual, performing and other art forms and real life. Part of the programme is a response to Tate Liverpool's Art, Lies and Videotape: Exposing Performance exhibition (14 November – 25 January 2004) which explores key moments in the history of performance art from the Futurists and Surrealists, to more contemporary artists like Vito Acconci and Ron Athey. Bluecoat's associated programme will present artists today working in a live context, including Sharon Smith, Robert Pacitti and this year's three Bluecoat Associate Artists Adrian Challis, Roger Hill and Rebecca Reid.

Adrian Challis will be presenting readings from his novel, XQ-28. These will be followed in the new year with The Secret History of the Twentieth Century, a one-man show.

Over two days, **Roger Hill** presents The Mandayana; the life and times of transgender heroine/ hero, Mandy Romero and her/ his global travels.

Rebecca Reid is currently developing a performance which examines the way we see performance and how we view art.

Her poetry and short stories are published in magazines and anthologies worldwide and she produces Saltpervert, a quarterly recording which offers collections of spoken word on CD. Salena also featured on the Coldcut albums, Let Us Play and Let Us Replay, alongside the likes of Jello Biafra and Grandmaster Flash.

CONNECT NEWS

Autumn sees Bluecoat release a poetry anthology created by young people from Speke Garston and West Derby.

The publication, which will be used in schools as well as for general reading, is the culmination of Speaking Your Language, a poets-in-residence project organised as part of Connect, Bluecoat's participation outreach programme. Earlier this year, over fifty days, poet/performers Maureen Almond and Michelle Scally-Clarke, collaborated with pupils at West Derby and New Heys Community Comprehensive Schools, Haymans Green Dental Practice, St Michael's Residential Home and Newsham Adult Education Centre's music group. The result was two nights of poetry performed live which was recorded onto a special CD and DVD. A video was also created for screening at the dental practice as patients received their treatment. Supported by the CD, this anthology is the final jigsaw piece of the project.
