DEVELOPMENT NEWS

Since Bluecoat closed to the public at the end of January work has been taking place behind the scenes to prepare for the construction of our new arts wing and the restoration of the building's historic fabric and improvement of existing spaces.

Bluecoat's long history dates back almost 300 years when it began life as a school. The front courtvard facades have remained remarkably intact since the early 18th century, but there have been successive changes and additions to other parts, each age leaving its mark on the building. 20th century alterations have covered up earlier phases. however it is now possible for our conservation architects Donald Insall Associates to investigate how much of the building remains from earlier times.

To help explain Bluecoat's story, examples from various periods will be revealed and incorporated into the refurbished interiors. From early photographs we know for example that the area now occupied by the ground floor gallery was once the school's dining hall and very different from today's small spaces. It is hoped that the historic character here can be largely reinstated and initial investigations reveal that much of the early 19th century timber beams. cast iron columns and lath and plaster ceilings still exist.

Other surveys have revealed walls and windows, once part of the exterior of the building and long since covered up. Second World War air raid shelters. buried in the garden, are also being revealed by hand digging, so as not to disturb the roots of the ash trees

CONNECT

Connect is Bluecoat's participation programme, which brings together artists and communities in creative collaboration. It continues while the building is closed for development. Here is news of some of our projects.

WILD! LIVERPOOL EXPERIENCE SCOOPS DADAFEST AWARD

The WILD! group from Halewood Resource Centre proudly accepted the award for Best Community Arts Project, voted for by disabled people during Disability and Deaf Arts Festival, DaDaFest, last December. Their two-year project, Liverpool Experience, was organised by Bluecoat in conjunction with Liverpool Biennial. Working with artist Andy Weston, the group's artworks, including a mural and light-boxes, have toured Merseyside since September, including the Museum of Liverpool Life.

The group and their support workers are delighted with the award. One participant, Joanne said, 'I'm more interested in art now, I see art in everything... The best was winning the DaDa award and being presented with it at Bluecoat. It's been like a dream.'

WILD! THE JOURNEY PREMIERES AT BLUECOAT

Last November a crowd at the Bluecoat gates welcomed stars of short film, The Journey, who arrived by limousine and were escorted up a red carpet to a host of flashing cameras, into a champagne reception. The film was the result of a two-year project involving service users and support workers from L8 Resource Centre and Fazakerley Croxteth Day Services, working with artist Leo Fitzmaurice. The Journey has since been shown at FACT, the Museum of Liverpool Life and Bluecoat Gallery.

THOUSANDS WATCH THIS SPACE



Last December and January Bluecoat, with support from Fivearts Cities, presented Watch This Space, an exhibition of work from three Connect projects: Holes, Making Space and WILD! The exhibition featured work by around 100 artists and participants - for many it was their first opportunity to exhibit in a gallery.

BRINGING THE CITY FARM INTO THE CITY CENTRE

A whispered poem, eggs and beetroot, a hand painted map and five girls in white boiler suits dance requests on strewn hay. Their photographic images surround the audience who sit supping tea on a hay bale or an old sofa. The mood changes, a fight breaks out. Momentarily ketchup flies, whipped cream splatters, mushy peas are airborne, spaghetti Bolognese creeps down a window pane, then they

emerge to dance again, complaining of the smell of food in which they wallowed...


This was the scene in the former Bluecoat bookshop space in January, when a group from Rice Lane City Farm Youth Project in Walton presented an installation and live art performance. The girls had been working since August with artists Roger Hill and Sharon Smith, making their first contact with live art and exploring its possibilities for creative expression. Drawing on Bluecoat's live art programme, Liverpool Live, and on their own experiences, the group's work brought the spirit of the farm into the city.

The installation has since been presented in St John's Shopping Centre (thanks to Marsha Freeman of Land Securities), at Walton Library and in the former barber-shop unit at Bluecoat. Tour organised by students from Liverpool Centre for Arts Development.

LIVERPOOL READS... SUBTERRANEAN EXHIBITION

Bluecoat played a big part in last year's citywide book read Liverpool Reads... The selected book, Holes by Louis Sachar, topped the Liverpool library loans chart and was read by people of all ages right across the city. The book inspired creative writing and visual art, including a Connect project in which artist Louise Wood worked with service users at Crown Street Mental Health Resource Centre and pupils at Lower Lee School.

Work from this project, exhibited at Bluecoat last year, will be on show again in Liverpool's own set of mysterious holes, the Williamson Tunnels Heritage Centre, The Old Stableyard, Smithdown Lane from 28 April – 26 May, open Tuesday - Sunday and Bank Holiday Mondays 10am – 6pm (last tour 5pm). Tunnels entry, including a guided tour: £3.50 adults, £3 concessions, £2 children.

THIS YEAR LIVERPOOL READS... MILLIONS BY FRANK COTTRELL BOYCE

Millions by Liverpool writer Frank Cottrell Bovce has been selected as the book for 2005/6. Based in Liverpool, it tells the story of two brothers getting used to life without their Mum who has recently died. One is obsessed with patron saints, the other with finance and real estate. When a bag stuffed with money seemingly drops out of the sky they find themselves suddenly rich - but the clock is ticking as the money is in sterling and the Euro is about to be introduced. Millions has recently been made into a feature film, due for general release soon, directed by Danny Boyle.

Bluecoat is again working with Crown Street and Lower Lee on a project relating to Millions. And you can get involved too in Liverpool Reads by reading the book yourself or to a friend, or encouraging others to read it. e-space lab:

SPACE, LIFE AND URBAN FABRIC, SHANGHAI AND LIVERPOOL SATURDAY 25 JUNE 10.00AM-4.00PM AT THE RENEW ROOMS, 82 WOOD STREET, LIVERPOOL Free

This event invites visitors to look through the prism of Shanghai's experience of rapid growth, in order to examine the transformations that Liverpool's own social and urban fabric is now undergoing.

e-space lab artists Philip Courtenay and Peter Hatton explore how spaces can be made into places through the activities of everyday life. They are interested in creating, through an art process, new types of space in shared virtual spaces. It is a process that parallels the relationship between the city and the neighbourhood, the collective and the individual. Their current research focuses on Shanghai, one of Liverpool's world

city twins, looking at the social and urban fabric of the Hongkou area, currently in a fugitive state of transition as it heads towards total transformation. Modernity is the watchword here, so what happens to everyday life?

The architectural high-rise messages of modernity and change loom large over old areas of the city made up of labyrinthine lanes and high-density housing, but the interaction of people moving between new and old areas also creates new possibilities for spaces.


This year's highlights include:
