





NEW FACES...

Bluecoat took another step towards realising its vision for the building and the organisation when it recently announced a key appointment to its staff, Alastair Upton, who joins us as Chief Executive.

Bluecoat Chairman Simon Ryder said. "I am delighted that Alastair is joining us. The Board is tremendously excited about the prospects for Bluecoat over the next few years, not least with Liverpool's position as European Capital of Culture in 2008. We are confident his appointment will secure and expand Bluecoat's position within the local and regional cultural infrastructure."

Alastair, who takes up his post in March, said, "I'm delighted to be moving to Bluecoat, an arts centre with almost a hundred years of history that is cherished by both the people of Liverpool and those who visit the city. The current transformation, the largest development since Bluecoat opened, will prepare it for 2008 and beyond".

The appointment will enable existing Bluecoat Director Bryan Biggs to focus on the creative programmes in his new role as Artistic Director. He says, "I look forward to being able to concentrate fully on the important job of developing Bluecoat's gallery, performance and arts participation activities, as well as strengthening our staff teams to deliver them."

Martha Hawkins has also recently joined Bluecoat as Head of Marketing. Of her new role she says, "I am extremely pleased to be part of the Bluecoat team re-launching the arts centre during this exciting time for the city of Liverpool. I look forward to building on Bluecoat's fine tradition and helping to shape its future."

Whilst the arts centre is closed for a £10 million development, Bluecoat is continuing with off site activities, outlined in this brochure. The development will expand and improve existing facilities, create a new arts wing and restore the historic fabric of the building, which will re-open in 2007

DEVELOPMENT NEWS

Bluecoat's exciting revitalisation continued with completion of the enabling works by Chester Masonry under the direction of Donald Insall Associates, Chester, and temporary relocation of the Bluecoat offices, Further investigative works and surveys are being carried out in preparation for the main contract starting on site in early Spring. Chris Wilson from Donald Insall reports on progress:

Demolition of the 1950s South West brick wing revealed the grand scale of the site, in which the new performance wing will be sited. Over 10,000 bricks were salvaged, these to be used in repairs to the existing building and works to the rear courtvard.

Internal excavations and investigations offered up historical evidence of the development of the curved wall to the rear of the central hub, as well as clearly showing the chronological order of the construction of the floors. dating from the building's earliest history.

Historic lime plasters were exposed, complete with original animal hair, to both the North West wing and throughout the central hub. Only partial fragments of the likely original oak flooring were found, with most areas replaced by the more locally prevalent Baltic pine. Despite this, the floorboards remain in good condition and will form a major part of the historic repairs to the building as a whole.

CONNECT

Connect, Bluecoat's participation programme that brings together artists and communities in creative collaboration, continues while the building is closed for development, operating from our temporary Out of the Bluecoat space on Paradise Street.

Participation Manager Bec Jones outlines latest developments:

POOL OF SOUND

Pool of Sound raised awareness of the everyday sounds we hear during this period of intense change in Liverpool city centre. Thirteen young people aged 11-22 went on an adventure in sound around the city with acoustic ecologist Phil Morton, performance poet Trevor Gerard and sonic artist Alex Decoupigny. They created a surround-sound collage of city sounds, which was presented in January with artwork and poetry, inspired by what they had heard, in the first exhibition in our Out of the Bluecoat space, having been presented earlier in Liverpool Culture Company's 08 Place.

For the project's second phase Alex and Phil will work with the group and local musicians to compose a piece of music inspired by the sounds of the city. The week-long project will culminate in a performance on the evening of 2 June (details in next brochure).

Pool of Sound is organised by Bluecoat with Merseyside Youth Association, Frakture, The Windows Project, with support from University of Liverpool Acoustic Research Unit. HERMITAGE
