## **DEVELOPMENT NEWS**

The construction phase of work on Bluecoat started in April with the appointment of Kier North West as the main contractor for the refurbishment and the construction of the new wing. Based locally in Kirkby, Kier were formerly known as William Moss and Sons and have had a long-standing presence in Merseyside. They actually worked at Bluecoat from 1947-1952, to repair damage caused in the Blitz.

Central Liverpool was heavily bombed during World War Two and on 3 May 1941, after sustained bombing, fire spread through Bluecoat. The north east wing was burnt out, its walls remained standing but the roof and floors collapsed, and the south east wing was destroyed. Two nights later the west side was hit by a high explosive bomb.

Due to the excessive bombing around Bluecoat during WW2, surveys have determined that the building is at medium risk of finding ordnance during intrusive works, so a bomb disposal expert will be on site with Kier during excavations to make sure there are no suprises.

## LIVERPOOL ARABIC **ARTS FESTIVAL**

2 - 16 JULY

This July Liverpool will come alive with the sights and sounds of the Arab world, with a city-wide feast of culture and entertainment. Celebrating all aspects of Arabic arts and traditions, this year's festival offers music, dance, arts, craft and food.

With Bluecoat closed for its development the fifth Liverpool Arabic Arts Festival takes place at venues across the city including FACT, Bluecoat Display Centre, Liverpool University, Unity Theatre, World Museum Liverpool and The Methodist Centre.

Over the two weeks, must-see highlights include: the Liverpool premiere of the first Yemeni feature film, A New Day in Old Sana'a; Texterminators, a performance play by Mai Ghoussoub fresh after showcasing in Beirut: Palestinian hip hop dancers, The Sport and Show Arts Academy; and Algerian music exponents Cheb Nacim and Fantazia. Also new this year is an Arabic dinner and dance night in Heswall Hall in Wirral.

This year's Festival kicks off with the popular Family Day at Sefton Park Palm House, providing an afternoon of live music and dance, workshops, stalls, food and a Mini Arabic Football World Cup! Don't miss out on this day of entertainment, activity and fun for all the family.



### SOUNDS OF A CITY IN TRANSITION

As part of Liverpool Culture Company's celebration of the changing face of Liverpool, local young people are collaborating with German composers Alex Decoupigny and Freider Bergner and Liverpool acoustic ecologist Phil Morton (Frakture). Integrating sound recordings of the city with musical instruments, they will create a piece of music that reflects Liverpool's current status as a city in transition.

Artist Andrew Small has created Kensington Drift, a fascinating sequence of photographic images accompanied by candid interviews with residents from the Kensington area, which was premiered earlier this year at FACT. The project, managed by Bluecoat and Metal, was one of seven similar projects taking place across the city organised by Liverpool Culture Company in partnership with the Neighbourhood Management Teams.

Since September pupils from Lower Lee School and service users from Crown Street Mental Health Resource Centre have worked to create with artist Simon McKeown objects and structures on the theme of hermitage. Following an exhibition in the Central Library in May, objects, models and photographs from the project will be exhibited in Out of the Bluecoat during Architecture Week. The exhibition will be open in June: Friday 16th 11am – 5pm; Saturday 17th 11am – 4pm; Thursday 22nd & Friday 23rd 11am – 5pm; Saturday 24th 11am – 4pm.

## FREE WORKSHOP SATURDAY 17 JUNE

Come along and contribute to the construction of a hermitage in Out of the Bluecoat. This free activity will be led by Simon McKeown and is suitable for all ages, but children must be accompanied by an adult. Drop in any time between 11am and 3pm.





#### THE BLUE ROOM

In April, Bluecoat started a new project provide contemporary arts activities for adults with learning difficulties when the building reopens. The Blue Room is an 18-month pilot scheme in partnership with Liverpool City Council's Supported Living Portfolio. It will use Bluecoat's arts programme as a starting point for a programme of creative collaborations between participants and artists. The Blue Room will be an important part of the Bluecoat community when we reopen.





### WAYFINDING

Artists Denise Armstrong, Ross Clark, Naomi Kendrick, Andy Weston and Max Zadow are working with local groups of disabled and Deaf people to explore people's experience of Bluecoat and make recommendations for improving access.

# CREATIVE PARTNERSHIPS WITH SCHOOLS

Bluecoat is developing new relationships with two Knowsley schools as part of a research project commissioned by Creative Partnerships Merseyside. Connect has been working with English teachers from All Saints High School in Kirkby and Halewood College to develop projects with Year 8 classes. Using an artwork from a contemporary exhibition as inspiration, teachers are experimenting with a new approach to teaching English.

Tate Liverpool and Liverpool Biennial are also conducting similar projects with schools in the region. The findings of this unique action research will be shared regionally and nationally. Bluecoat hopes to continue a relationship with the schools in the future and will look to work across other subject areas next academic year.

## **ARTIST'S COMMISSION**

### SPECIMEN COLONY ALEC FINLAY

Artist Alec Finlay has been commissioned by Bluecoat to create a participative sculpture while the building is closed. Specimen Colony takes as its starting point the representation of birds on postage stamps from around the world and the migration of peoples.

The artist will collaborate with local people to produce a series of nest boxes in the exotic colours of bird plummage. These will be located in 'colonies' in green spaces around Liverpool, including the Bluecoat garden when the building reopens in 2007. A reflection on dwelling and diaspora, Specimen Colony also mirrors the contemporary city - vibrant, colourful and hybrid. It is particularly pertinent to Liverpool, with its Liver Bird symbol and its history as a port of arrival and departure.
