

Like Love: Part One originated from a residency by Sonia Boyce at the Meriton School for Young Parents, Bristol and was shown last October at Spike Island. From classroom discussions Boyce produced artworks that address fragmentary experience of longing, and raise questions about due care and contemporary life. The installation of drawings, prints, animation and sound explores universal ideas around the emotions we invest in others.

Evolving across partner venues in Bristol, Liverpool and Stoke, each manifestation of Like Love is different. The Bluecoat features the Meriton work alongside new work made in collaboration with Blue Room, an arts service for adults with learning difficulties based at the Bluecoat in partnership with Liverpool City Council.

From conversations with Blue Room members on the topic of love, Boyce filmed them and support staff dancing to their favourite love songs on Crosby beach. This and other encounters with care inspired this new work, which has been supported by Liverpool PCT.

Boyce has been invited to curate another exhibition alongside Like Love in recognition of her ongoing relationship with the Bluecoat since first exhibiting in Black Skin/Bluecoat in 1985. Action features video, drawing, installation and sculpture by four artists selected to highlight Boyce's interest in the depictions of performative actions in art.

Like her work with Blue Room, much of Boyce's recent work has involved what she calls 'improvised' collaborations, where the participation of others helps create artworks. These often involve performing, and it is this interest in the 'performative' that has drawn her to these emerging artists.

Boyce has also responded to Afro Modern: Journeys through the Black Atlantic, a major survey exhibition at Tate Liverpool, which includes one of her earlier works. Action can be contextualised through this exhibition and recent debates about the emergence of black artists whose works move beyond perceived boundaries of race and representation.

Like Love is an Arts Council England National Touring Exhibition commissioned by Spike Island in partnership with the Bluecoat and the Potteries Museum & Art Gallery. and will be documented in a publication at the end of the tour.

The Bluecoat along with National Museums Liverpool and Tate Liverpool has teamed up to give students from local secondary schools a unique opportunity to showcase their artistic talents. Reclaim Your Space is part of Find Your Talent, a national programme to encourage young people to take part in 5 hours of cultural activity each week.

Art and Design students from Sutton High Sports College, and Creative and Media Diploma students from Kirkby Sports College have been working on their submissions over the last term. The work for the exhibition has been selected with input from small groups of pupils and includes a series of multi-media light boxes and short films, and stop-frame animation. This is a great opportunity to see some of the up and coming artistic talent in the area. Art works will be displayed in the Vide and outside the Upstairs bistro.





Lemn Sissay:



Sissay presents the most serious of subjects through a journey of mental gymnastics and laughter to discover why he doesn't hate white people.

Print Studio

There are now two print studios at the Bluecoat. The intaglio studio specialises in 'safe' etching (using acrylic resists and salt mordants). Recently we added a new water-based screen printing studio. To make use of these facilities there are courses and workshops. Drypoint, the simplest of the intaglio techniques, is easily recognisable with its strong velvety line. Great prints can be made quickly from card, plastic, aluminium or zinc. In this workshop artist and illustrator Phil Marsden (Compromise Comics) teaches how to combine this straight forward medium with the intense tones and painterly marks provided by printing from Carborundum. Two basic and complementary techniques to get you started in the intaglio studio.

Etched and Incised Lino with Martin Kochany £60/55

Versatile and still relatively cheap, lino is traditionally cut to create a relief print, but increasingly printmakers are ditching their cutters in favour of etching the linoleum. Here Martin Kochany (Hot Bed Press) teaches how to combine cutting and etching to produce a block which can be printed relief or intaglio style.
